Keynote Speakers



Fr Stephen Bevans SVD

Stephen Bevans is a priest of the Society of the Divine Word. Ordained in 1971, he served from 1972 until 1981 as a missionary to the Philippines and is currently the Louis J. Luzbetak, SVD Professor of Mission and Culture at Catholic Theological Union, Chicago, where he has taught since 1986. Fr Bevans has lectured all over the world, including the Philippines, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Germany and Italy, and in many places in the United States as well. He is the author of *Models of Contextual Theology* (1992), *An Introduction to Theology in Global Perspective* (2009), and, with Roger Schroeder, *Constants in Context* (2004) and *Prophetic Dialogue* (2011), and, with Jeffrey Gros, *Evangelization and Freedom* (2009). He has served as president of the American Society of Missiology (2006) and on the board of directors of the Catholic Theological Society of America (2007-2009).



Dr Gemma Tulud Cruz

Gemma Tulud Cruz has taught for a number of years in the United States before moving to Australia where she is currently Senior Lecturer in Theology at Australian Catholic University in Melbourne. She holds a Ph.D in Theology from Radboud Universiteit Nijmegen in the Netherlands. Her main research focus is migration. She is author of An Intercultural Theology of Migration: Pilgrims in the Wilderness and recently completed One Bread, One Body, One People: Challenges of Migration. Her other areas of interest include missiology, women and gender issues, contextual theologies, global Catholicism, and theologies of liberation.



Archbishop Mark Coleridge

Archbishop Mark Coleridge was ordained as an Auxiliary Bishop of Melbourne in 2002, appointed as the Archbishop of Canberra-Goulburn in 2006 and the Archbishop of Brisbane in 2012. After ordination in 1974 Fr Coleridge worked as an assistant priest in various Melbourne parishes before being invited to study Sacred Scripture in Rome. He completed a doctorate in Sacred Scripture in 1992. He has worked in the Vatican Secretariat of State and been Master of the Catholic Theological College, Melbourne. Archbishop Coleridge is also a member of the Pontifical Council for Social Communications and the Pontifical Council for Culture. He is the Chairman of the Bishops Commission for Liturgy and a member of the Bishops Commission for Doctrine and Morals (ACBC).



Keynote Speakers

Sr Maureen McBride RNDM

Maureen McBride has extensive experience in leadership, formation and education. She has been the Congregational Leader of the Sisters of Our Lady of the Missions since 2002. The congregation has over 1,000 members living and ministering in 23 countries across the world. Since 2008 new foundations have been opened in South Sudan, Laos, Thailand, Kazakhstan and Taiwan. Sr Maureen has held positions in university faculties in New Zealand and the Philippines. She holds a Master of Arts in French and German as well as a Master of Theology from the Maryknoll School of Theology, New York. She has been a member of the SEDOS Executive, Rome (Service of Documentation and Study on Global Mission).



Mrs Kath Evans

Kath Evans has become well-known as the person whose cure from cancer in 1996 was accepted as the second miracle in the cause of the canonisation of Mary MacKillop. In 2010 Kath and her husband Barry travelled to Rome and took part in the canonisation ceremonies there. Since then Kath and Barry have responded to the hundreds of invitations from the media and from groups around Australia to share their experience of God's grace through Mary MacKillop. They recognise that though they are 'very ordinary people' they have been called to respond in God's mission. Kath's book published by Michael Joseph (Penguin Books) in 2012, *The Story Behind Saint Mary MacKillop's Second Miracle*, documents her remarkable cure. Kath and Barry have five children, 20 grandchildren and are welcoming the next generation into their family.



H. E. Jose Ramos-Horta

H. E. Jose Ramos-Horta started his professional life as a journalist but was exiled in 1970 to Mozambique where he worked towards securing independence for East Timor. After the withdrawal of the Portuguese colonial authorities, Jose Ramos-Horta joined the newly founded Fretilin party and continued to work for independence. Following invasion by Indonesia, he represented Fretilin at the UN from 1977 to 1985, advocating for human rights and promoting a peace plan to end the violence in his country. He obtained qualifications in Public International Law, Peace Studies and Human Rights Law. In 1996, Jose Ramos-Horta and Bishop Carlos Belo were awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. Since independence in 1999, Jose Ramos-Horta has served as both President and Prime Minister of Timor-Leste in addition to other ministerial roles. He has advocated for forgiveness as 'human being, victim and head of state'.

Ms Brooke Clark

Brooke Clark is passionate about using social justice to invite young people into the heart of the Church and she has channelled that passion into youth ministry. Since graduating from the University of Notre Dame Australia in 2011 with a Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Secondary Education, she uses her role as classroom teacher to engage with teenagers by challenging the youth of today to step up and be the change they wish to see in the world.



Mr John Cleary

John Cleary is a member of the ABC's specialist Religion Unit and has been described as 'one of Australia's leading commentators on religious affairs'. John is best known for his years with Radio National as presenter of 'The Religion Report' and the philosophy program 'Meridian'. He was part of the original 'Compass' team on ABC TV, and was for several years a weekly part of the Triple J morning program. During his career with the ABC John has worked for extended periods in Perth, Melbourne, and Sydney. John's appointment to Sunday Night on local radio in 2001 marked a welcome return to a spot John occupied on local and metropolitan radio in the early 1990s. In 1994 his book on the Salvation Army in Australia *Salvo* was awarded Australian Religious Book of the Year.



Dr Therese D'Orsa

Therese D'Orsa is a Catholic missiologist and educational leader who has exercised a range of leadership roles in Catholic education systems and has taught in several tertiary institutions. She is currently conjoint professor of the University of Newcastle and Broken Bay Institute, an honorary fellow of Australian Catholic University and research associate of the MCD University of Divinity. Therese is a foundation Board Member of the Yarra Institute for Religion and Social Policy.



Speakers/Presenters

Dr John Falzon

John Falzon is Chief Executive Officer of the St Vincent de Paul Society National Council of Australia. He has written and spoken widely on the structural causes of marginalisation and inequality in Australia and has long been involved in advocacy campaigns for a fairer and more equitable society. John has worked in academia, in research and advocacy with NGOs, and in community development in large public housing estates. He holds degrees in Literature, Theology, Philosophy, Politics and Social Analysis. He is also a published poet. John was a participant in the 2020 Summit, has served as a member of the ACOSS board and has also served on Government advisory committees. He is a member of the Australian Social Inclusion Board. John has recently published *The Language of the Unheard*.



Ambassador Abel Guterres

His Excellency Mr Abel Guterres is Timor-Leste's ambassador to Australia. He grew up in the mountain village of Baguia, one of thirteen children. From an early age he worked to support his siblings and at the age of sixteen became a primary school teacher. He came to Australia in 1975 as a refugee, later becoming an Australian citizen and raising his five children in Australia. Abel worked as a tram and bus driver in Melbourne until 1999 while working continuously as an activist on behalf of his people. In 2000 he was chosen by the then Foreign Minister, H.E. Dr Jose Ramos-Horta to undertake postgraduate studies at Oxford University, subsequently serving in a number of positions in the new administration. In 2003, he was appointed as Timor Leste's first Consul-General to Australia, and has served as Ambassador since 2010.



Mr Martin Laverty

Martin Laverty is the CEO of Catholic Health Australia. He is Chair of the NSW Heart Foundation, and a member of the National Heart Foundation Board. He is a member of the NSW Public Service Commission Advisory Board, and in 2013 retired as Chair of the NSW disability organisation Sunshine. Martin has previously held roles at the NSW Parliament, the NSW Muscular Dystrophy Association, The Smith Family, and Burson-Marsteller. He is a former Board director of the NSW Muscular Dystrophy Association, and former Chair of the disability service provider Challenge Southern Highlands. He holds a Master of Comparative Constitutional Laws, and is a doctoral candidate completing a PhD on the contribution of non-executive directors to organisational outcomes. He has contributed to two books: What If? and Determining the Future: A Fair Go & Health for All, both published by Connor Court.

Mr Graeme Mundine

Graeme Mundine, a Bundjalung man from Northern NSW, has been involved in Church and Indigenous affairs for more than three decades. As a Marist Brother he commenced his working life as a teacher and later worked in youth ministry. In 1991, Graeme took up the role of inaugural Chair and Coordinator of the newly formed National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC). He was instrumental in establishing NATSICC as a vibrant Aboriginal voice within the Catholic Church. Graeme then joined the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Ecumenical Commission (NATSIEC), a commission of the National Council of Churches in Australia (NCCA). Graeme is now the Executive Officer of the Aboriginal Catholic Ministry in the Archdiocese of Sydney.



Sr Mary Ellen O'Donoghue RSJ

Mary Ellen is a Sister of St Joseph who has a background in education and has also lived and worked in the Pilbarra region of Western Australia. She is the CEO of Good Grief Ltd, an Australian not-for-profit organisation which provides programs for children, young people and adults challenged by loss and change. From its flagship program Seasons for Growth initiated in 1996, Good Grief has researched and developed a range of other programs including Stormbirds: Growing Through Natural Disasters, in response to calamitous bush fires in Australia. These programs are used internationally and Good Grief provides the training for program facilitators. Through Good Grief Ltd she now leads a team committed to assisting children, young people and adults grow through grief and loss into resilient people. Their commitment extends to encouraging the creation of networks of support and connectedness within communities.
